VEVJ80: OUR SHARED STORY

Thank you for registering for VEVJ Day 80: Our Shared Story – educational resources to support young people's engagement with the 80th anniversary of VE and VJ Day, deepening their understanding of how our shared history shapes the present and future.

Eighty years after the end of the Second World War, as the conflict moves beyond living memory, we are launching the largest-ever national effort to preserve and pass on the stories of those whose courage, sacrifice, and resilience secured the freedoms we cherish today. Through this programme, schools and young people across the country can take part in activities that bring history to life, ensuring these stories continue to inspire generations to come.

VE DAY 80: THURSDAY 8 MAY 2025 AND VJ DAY 80: FRIDAY 15 AUGUST 2025

On 8 May 2025, the UK will mark VE Day 80 (Victory in Europe Day), a landmark moment commemorating the end of the Second World War in Europe, and on August 15, mark VJ Day 80, the end of the war in the Pacific and the end of the conflict. To honour this historic occasion, some of the nation's leading cultural organisations are developing engaging, interactive, and thought-provoking educational experiences to connect children and young people directly with the lived experiences of the Second World War generation.

Through storytelling, hands-on activities, and encounters with veterans, students will gain a firsthand understanding of the war's impact and its lasting significance in today's world.

VEVJ 80: Our Shared Story is part of a national programme of events and celebrations that will bring people together to share stories of the Second World War generation and pay tribute to the millions of people across the UK and Commonwealth who served in the Second World War, telling the stories of those who fought, the children who were evacuated, and those who stepped into the essential roles on the Home Front.

We are creating films for students in Primary, Secondary and Further Education settings to help them explore the stories of VE and VJ Day as well as a Q&A with experts to enable students to reflect on the events of 80 years ago.

I'LL REMEMBER: DISCOVERING THE STORIES OF VE AND VJ DAY INCLUDES:

▶ *I'll Remember* Original Song Composed By Simon Haw

A brand-new song has been composed for the project by BAFTA award winning composer Simon Haw MBE. Called I'll Remember, the song is a lyrical journey of reflection and hope set to soaring music. The song is available here for teachers and pupils to listen to and learn and users will be encouraged to use the song as part of their school VE Day celebrations

► I'll Remember: Discovering the Stories of VE and VJ Day Films - I'll Remember - Documentary Drama Films

An opportunity for young people across the UK to connect with veterans and hear their stories.

Through these educational documentary films, young people will visit different locations around the UK to discover the impact of the Second World War on people and communities, learn more about the people who lived through the conflict and hear young people's perspectives on these stories. The stories in the film will help form a digital time capsule for future generations to remember the service and sacrifice of those who served in the Second World War.

O&A Session films

Q&A sessions for each age group with historians and experts gives a group of students from selected Primary, Secondary and Further Education settings the opportunity to ask questions and engage in discussions about the end of the Second World War. This is a unique opportunity for young people to connect with veteran experiences and understand their stories.

Supporting Learning Resources

Learning resources for each age-range, designed for teachers and learners to extend their exploration of the topic beyond the video content. Activities will include: song writing, art, creating a digital time capsule and more...

VE80: LEARNING FROM LETTERS

A learning resource that explores the end of the Second World War and the moments leading up to and after VE Day, told through personal stories and objects from IWM's collections.

IWM is inviting schoolchildren (including via their grandparents and parents as a primary audience) across the UK to learn about the Second World War by delving into their own family histories to discover the letters sent by their relatives to loved ones. What was it like to be part of VE Day celebrations? How did people feel? Was VE Day the end of the Second World War?

IWM's new learning resource connects students to the **when**, **why** and **what** it means now for the 80th anniversary of VE Day, while contextualising VJ Day within the end of the Second World War.

Students will unlock the personal stories of children, civilians and service personnel who experienced VE Day firsthand through specially chosen sources from IWM's collections including letters, diaries, sound testimony and film, photographs, and art.

Each source will include questions to consider, supporting student's critical inquiry skills and conversations. A workshop activity also invites students to write letters or draw illustrations and make links, using sources and personal stories as inspiration.

Learning From Letters introduces your students to the people and stories of VE Day and challenges them to historically connect to this important national moment of celebration and commemoration.

This resource is designed to be used in classroom or assembly time, with activities that support differentiated learning.



BY PARTICIPATING IN LEARNING THROUGH LETTERS, YOUR STUDENTS WILL:

- ▶ Be able to confidently have conversations about VE Day, its impact at the time, and its legacy and significance today on the 80th anniversary.
- Develop knowledge and understanding about the causes, course, and consequences of the end of the Second World War, specifically related to VE Day and VJ Day.
- ➤ Develop critical thinking and research skills using primary and secondary sources including letters, diaries, sound testimonies, photographs, art and film.
- ▶ Develop letter writing, art and design skills.

National Theatre

THE NEXT MORNING SCHOOLS PROGRAMME

A year-long, nationwide programme from the National Theatre - connected to the tour of *Dear England* - that engages directly with young people and schools.

The Next Morning gathers, animates and connects the stories and hopes of children and young people from 1945 and those of the children and young people of 2025. Comprising of a new film, produced by the National Theatre, supported by a nationwide creative writing and oracy project, The Next Morning will create a new archive of young people's hopes and ideas and give them a voice in shaping the future.

What hopes do young people have for themselves and their communities eighty years from now?

Inspired by Gareth Southgate's *Dear England* letter, and rooted in the themes of *Dear England* and VE Day – renewal, resilience, hope, and a shared national identity – this project invites students to reflect on the past and imagine the future.

Launching in **May 2025**, *The Next Morning Schools Programme* offers secondary schools the chance to explore these themes through creative writing and spoken word. Led by the National Theatre, this initiative empowers young people to contribute to a national conversation about their aspirations and the world they want to build.

THE NEXT MORNING SCHOOLS PROGRAMME INCLUDES:

- A free teaching resource designed for Key Stage 3 & 4 students studying English, Drama, History, and PSHE.
- In-school workshops and assemblies in locations across England, led by National Theatre practitioners.
- A platform for student voices students' work will be recorded and shared as part of the *Dear England* tour.
- Subsidised tickets for students to attend a performance of *Dear England* at their local theatre.

Between **September 2025** and **March 2026**, workshops, assemblies, and matinee performances will take place in 16 cities across England: Plymouth, Nottingham, Canterbury, Sheffield, Leeds, Newcastle, Chichester, Southampton, Milton Keynes, Oxford, Norwich, Woking, Bradford, Wimbledon, Liverpool, and Birmingham.

By the end of the project, a year after the 80th anniversary of VE and VJ Day, we will have created a new archive of young people's voices, hopes and ideas - made in schools and shared in places across the UK.

VE DAY 80 IMMERSIVE

VE Day 80 Immersive is a web-based augmented reality experience that brings key moments from Victory in Europe Day to life for its 80th anniversary. Designed to transport students back to 8 May 1945, this interactive resource enables them to experience history firsthand.

Developed in partnership with Imperial War Museums, *VE Day 80 Immersive* employs cutting-edge technology to dimensionalise and colourise four distinct images from VE Day. Paired with authentic voices from the time, this experience offers a compelling way to engage young people with the stories, emotions, and legacy of one of history's most significant moments.

Victory in Europe Day marked the end of six years of war against Nazi Germany and was met with extraordinary celebrations. Across the UK and beyond, streets filled with people rejoicing in the long-awaited arrival of peace. Yet, behind every iconic photograph of jubilation lies a deeply personal story – one of resilience, sacrifice, and uncertainty about the future.

Beyond the street parties and cheering crowds, many service personnel and their families faced a stark reality. There was fear that the service personnel who had fought in Europe might be sent to Asia or the Pacific to fight in the war against Japan. The relief of victory was tempered by anxiety about what lay ahead.

This immersive AR experience brings these historical moments into your classroom, using four powerful photographs from VE Day as the gateway to personal accounts from those who lived it. Through historical audio recordings, students can step into these pivotal scenes, hearing firsthand the diverse experiences of a generation who witnessed both the joy of peace and the uncertainty of a world still in transition.
